Level 1	Describes a basic opinion about the topic. May only mention philosophers, not what they thought. Low quality of English – SpaG (Spelling, punctuation and grammar)	1-3
Level 2	Describes their own view on philosophers and will mention specific philosophers, but maybe not with great detail or accuracy. Fair SPaG – some mistakes. May not be structured very clearly.	4-6
Level 3	Explanations of their own and others' views. Mentions at least two specific philosophers in some detail. Comes to a clear conclusion. Good SPaG with some errors but a good structure.	7-9
Level 4	Detailed explanations of their own and others' opinions. Mentions at least two philosophers in some detail. Comes to a clear, justified conclusion. Excellent SPaG – few errors and good structure.	10-12
